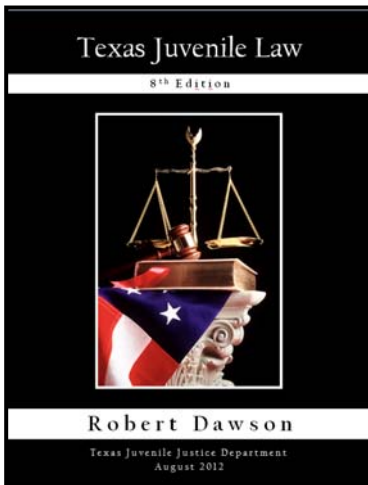

Professor Dawson died in February 2005 but his book continues as updated, with editing by the Texas Juvenile Justice Department's Legal Division and a select group of guest editors, many of whom are board-certified juvenile law judges, prosecutors and defense attorneys. The 8th Edition will remain an essential reference book on Texas juvenile law and will continue Professor Dawson's proud tradition.

The 8th Edition of *Texas Juvenile Law* is the most comprehensive reference book on Texas juvenile law and the juvenile justice system and includes both a perfect bound copy of the book and a searchable CD-ROM for easy, electronic reference. It reflects juvenile justice reforms made by the 82nd Texas Legislature in 2011, and **Volume I** contains chapters regarding the Juvenile Justice Information System, Juvenile Files and Records, Determinate Sentencing, Juvenile Procedures in Justice and Municipal Courts, Recent Appellate Court Decisions in Juvenile Cases, School Related Issues, Progressive Sanctions, Chapter 55, Parental Rights and Responsibilities and much, much more. This edition will include new chapters on Juvenile Board Duties and Responsibilities, Facilities and the newly created Texas Juvenile Justice Department. **Volume II** contains all pertinent statutes affecting the juvenile justice system, including the administrative rules (standards) of the Texas Juvenile Justice Department (formerly Texas Juvenile Probation Commission and the Texas Youth Commission) as published in the Texas Administrative Code. This volume will also include national standards related to the Civil Rights of Institutionalized Persons Act (CRIPA) and Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA).
